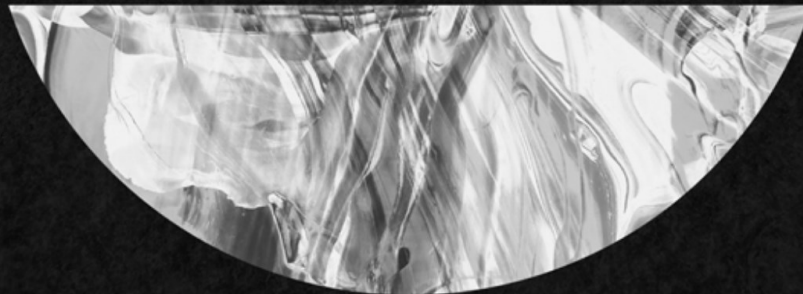

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

Four couples rented a summer house for two months. Each couple took a two-week vacation there and took the combined thirteen children of the four families with them. One couple was bragging on this clever plan to a friend when the friend said, "I don't think two weeks in a house with thirteen children would be much of a vacation." "Oh no," the couple replied. "Those two weeks were absolutely terrible. The vacation was the six weeks at home without the children." Vacation is not about the place; rather it is about the trouble-free and quiet time around the vacationer. It is a place where one can be just one's own self.

Today's first reading shares Job's experience of misery and hopelessness around him. With all that is going on in the world, we too may feel like Job, that life is burdensome and full of drudgery, making us feel like a slave who longs for the shade. We may identify with Job by seeing nothing in and around us promising happiness again.

But in today's Gospel Jesus awakens in each of us the inner strength and peace to live our life fully well amid all challenges. Today's Gospel is the story of Jesus healing Simon's mother-in-law. That evening the whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons. Consequently, the next day people were looking for him to be blessed by Jesus. When the disciples reported to Jesus, "Everyone is looking for you." Jesus told them, "Let us go on to the nearby villages that I may preach there also. For this purpose, have I come."

The response of Jesus seems to be a very blunt refusal to attend to the need of the people. He continued explaining why he was going to other villages. It was to announce His purpose of why He came. What is His purpose that would justify His leaving behind the people who looked for Him? In Mark 1:14, Jesus revealed His purpose. "Jesus came to Galilee proclaiming the gospel of God: "This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel."

His purpose was to proclaim the arrival of God's kingdom among the people. The healing He did the previous day was a proclamation of God's kingdom among them. His every healing was a proclamation of the reality that they are already living in God's kingdom. Jesus's healing ministry is not merely an attempt to get rid of all the sickness. His purpose was not just healing alone but to make people live as God's kingdom people and to make their lives whole and full. Jesus's ministry is to influence the positive presence of God's kingdom. The more the people live this reality of God's kingdom, the more they would heal and live fully well experiencing God's promises.

By His decision to move to other villages Jesus wanted to let the people be aware that His mission is a wholistic one. By His healing Jesus proclaimed that in the Kingdom of God the people are not only healed from what they are suffering, but also are blessed to live their life in its fullness. Jesus is not merely a wonder worker removing that which hinders life but the proclaimer of God's kingdom among us making us live fully well. Jesus is not only a healer but the fulfilment of God's promise for His people. As God's Kingdom-people we are invited not only to be healed but also to live our lives in fulness. Jesus's proclamation assures us that to us, God's Kingdom-people God has given all what we need to live fully well healed and blessed.

His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

The Mass: Liturgy of the Eucharist - Part IV

It's time to return to our look at the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Two weeks ago, we reviewed the blessing prayers that the priest says over the bread and wine.

The next step is for the priest to bow before the bread and wine. He prays quietly a special prayer that asks God to not only accept this sacrifice as pleasing, but in our collective "humble spirit and contrite heart" that we too be accepted by God. This is part of the fulfillment of the ordained priesthood; a priest is ordained to offer sacrifices.

In certain Masses, incense is used over the gifts, altar and Cross. After that, a deacon will take the thurible and first incense the priest and any other priests or deacons present in the sanctuary. He will then go out to the assembly, and, bowing to them, incense all present as well. Incense always signifies prayers offered to God. This action also signifies the sacrifice of ourselves as humble Christians, as we offer up our life to God.

You'll then notice the altar servers will approach the priest with a *lavabo* (a glass bowl), a white cloth, and a cruet of water. The priest prays "Wash me, O Lord, from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin," as the water is poured over his fingers. This reminds us of how the high priest in the

Jewish temple needed to be pure in order to offer sacrifices to God. Finally, we are invited to stand as the priest leads us all in a prayer that the sacrifice may be acceptable to God. We respond, asking that God sees this offering of bread and wine, at the hands of the priest, as the means by which God will be glorified, and for our benefit as well. For this offering will soon become the Real Presence of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

"The bread and wine ... will be offered by the priest ... in the Eucharistic Sacrifice, in which they will become [Christ's] body and blood. The Church offers this pure oblation to the Creator, when she offers what comes forth from his creation with thanksgiving." – *Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 1350.*
